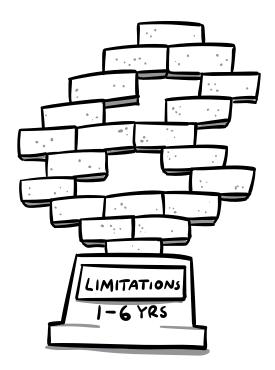

If you have never practiced jackassery, you may be asking yourself, "What is jackassery?"

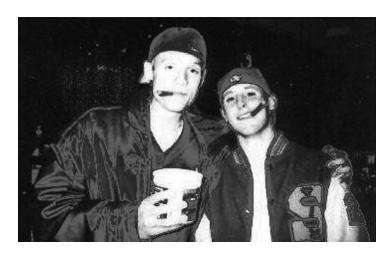
Well, my friend, the word "jackassery" comes from the root word "jackass." The good folks at Merriam-Webster define a "jackass" as:

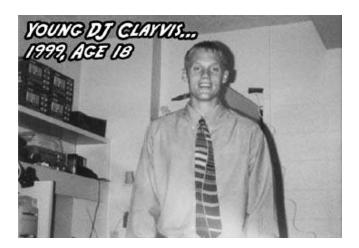

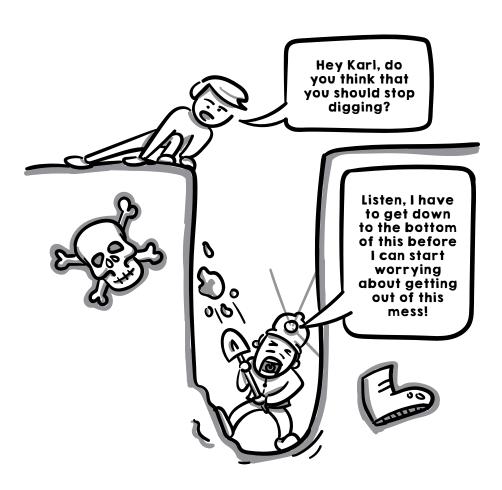
I never thought it could happen, this rappin' stuff

He may be off when it comes to his understanding of what makes a healthy relationship, but then again, so is most of our culture. The dark force of jackassery is strong enough to rip nearly any marriage apart.

In the future there will be a song written and recorded by Andre 3000 of OutKast called "Hey Ya!", which will eventually become the most requested song at weddings. I have sent you the lyrics from the future so that you can see an example of the songs of a culture that endorses jackassery. Let's dive deep into the meaning of a portion of this song.

Clay, trust me here. I have smelled the fresh air of the future. I have already gone to the deep, dark crevasse of crappy marriages and I have emerged from this hole, my friend! I have had to change nearly everything about my lifestyle to kill the man-bear-pig that I had become. If I could do it, you can do it, but it's going to take some honest self-evaluation and a commitment to change.

Remember when you first dated her...

She wanted to be wanted and she still wants to be wanted.

But now, you don't take her on dates, ever. Your entertainment company is growing virally and every event planner wants you to personally entertain for their event. Every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and holiday (except for Christmas) for the past seven years, you have DJ'ed a party for a paying client. 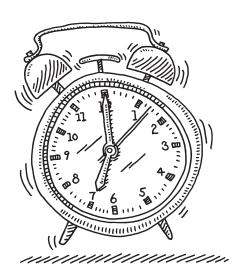

I know that you are excited to see how much your life will improve now that you've decided to actually schedule time to take your wife on weekend dates, take your kids to the office when possible and schedule a weekly family time on Sundays for all of you to get together to grill and conversationally marinate. My friend, I can still sense the presence of a little jackassery buried deep inside your heart, mind and soul, but I know that you can kill it once and for all if you'll just focus on learning these last four lessons.

PROMOTION EQUALS MORE PROBLEMS

Success is beginning to happen for you. Your business ventures are all beginning to boom, but you cannot let this mean you revert to a life of jackassery by choosing to once again do everything yourself. In fact, you must do the opposite. You are going to be involved in a partnership with nine different companies even as you are the proud dad of five kids! You are about to experience massive growth in many areas of your life! Sorry to ruin the surprise, but your wife is going to have twins in the future. I know you thought that you were going to have another boy, but nope. You are going to have twin girls, Laya and Scarlett. Mentally marinate on that thought for a while. Five kids; four of them girls. Boom. In your face!

Because your life is going to get much more complicated, you must begin to simplify things and become an elite manager of time. Don't think you'll have to do this all on your own, though. In the future, you are actually going to partner with a legendary time management expert who is going to teach you what you need to know to become one of the elite time management experts on the planet. But why not take a sneak peak at some of these secrets a few years early?

Questions:

Did you schedule time to think today?

When in your schedule do you intentionally set aside time to THINK?

5. Put a priority code next to each item in my planner. I use an "*" for items that are urgent, an "A" for items that are vital, a "B" for items that are simply important, and so on.

Question:

Are you putting a priority code next to each item in your planner?

6. When you get any free time, address the items marked "*" first until you finish the urgent tasks of the day. Then start the vital tasks that are coded "A." These vital things can be started today with something as simple as a phone call, but they may take six months to several years to complete. An example of a vital item might be to get into shape or get your MBA. Vital things may take a while to complete, but they have a big payoff (big bang for the buck theory). Next, you move to the items marked "B" – the important things, which are often routine but important nevertheless. These could be things like paying your tuition or doing the payroll. These tasks are important and need attention, but they are not urgent. Urgent tasks, to me, need to be addressed within a few hours.

Questions:

Are you really putting a priority code next to each item in your planner?

Do you have one centralized planner or are you attempting to implement the jackassery system of "planning" in which you write some to-do list items in your journal, some in your calendar at home, and some on your calendar at work?

7. Write down everything in your Day-Timer and carry it with you 24/7. When you make a commitment, write it down in the planner and then follow through.

Think before you add things to your planner. During your planning time, think about the different responsibilities in your life that you currently have or should have. For instance, I (Lee) think about my wife, my son and his wife, my three grandchildren, my job, my direct reports, my boss, my obligations to non-profit organizations I participate in within the community and church, financial planning for retirement, my health, my work partners, friends and parents. We all have responsibilities in our lives. Most people do not do a good job following through with them. If you make a list of your responsibilities and then think about them every day, you will be pleasantly surprised how much more you will get done in each area.

The list of responsibilities naturally grows as you get married or have kids or as you agree to take on additional responsibilities. This process of taking time to intentionally review your responsibilities is a great way to ensure that you have not forgotten anything to which you may have committed. Questions:

On a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the highest rating, how would you rate your reputation for getting done what you say you are going to get done?

Justify your rating.

What action steps do you need to begin taking today to improve your time management skills, based on Lee's system?

Clay, don't over complicate this. Read Lee's rules again and begin implementing them right now. There is no other effective way to become a good manager of your time. Don't deny it! I was there. There you were saying to yourself, "Rodriguez...Rodriguez! He seems like a trustworthy guy. I'll vote for him. Now as for Thompson...I hate the name Thompson! I used to partner with a guy with the last name Thompson who really screwed me. So I am definitely going to cast my vote against Thompson. I hope Thompson loses."

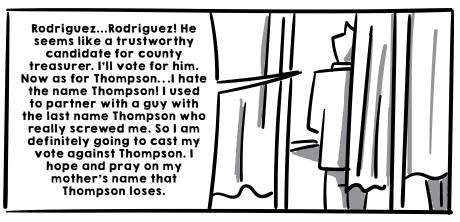
To say that your system for choosing judges in local elections is dumb would be an epic understatement. It may, in fact, surpass Kanye West's idiocy when he said, "Sometimes people write novels and they just be so wordy and so self-absorbed. I am not a fan of books. I would never want a book's autograph." No. Kanye's statement still wins for being the premier example of idiocy in American history. But your system for picking judges is a close second.

Now that we've addressed your mindless voting process, let's move on. Here is the process to achieve entrepreneurial success in the business world:

Define. Act. Measure. Refine. What does that mean? Let me break it down for you like fractions.

DEFINE

When you are innovating, starting a business, or attempting to have success in the world of business, you must start with an educated guess - a hypothesis about the nature and source of the problem and your possible solution. Such a hypothesis must be based on observations of how your potential solution would appeal to likely buyers, be implemented

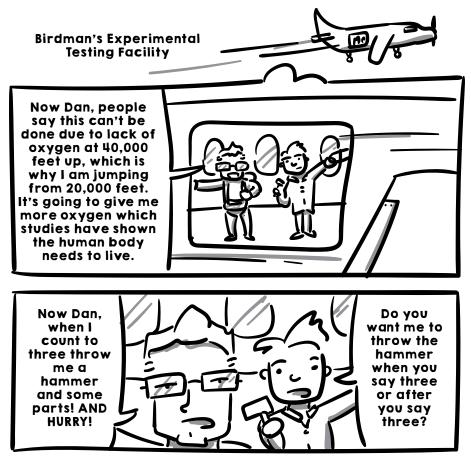




by your employees, and affect the problem both short and long term. When formulating your hypothesis, you must understand that it is not possible to experience success without first experiencing a few emotional and financial setbacks. Hypotheses are proven or disproven through time and application. I think Reid Hoffman, the founder of Linkedin and one of the founding members of PayPal, explains entrepreneurship best when he says, "You jump off a cliff and you assemble an airplane on the way down."

ACT

Once you have formatted your hypothesis into an actionable plan, you must then take action in a methodical way. You can't study the issue so much that you are overwhelmed with options. This is commonly referred to as paralysis by analysis. The late, great success author Napoleon Hill said it best, "Action is the real measure of intelligence."

MEASURE

When you take action as a businessperson, you need to measure the results. Was your hypothesis correct or not? Were you wrong? Don't get emotional, just measure the results and determine whether your assumptions and proposed solutions were correct or how you can improve next time. The inventor of the first fully functional light bulb, the inventor of recorded sound, the inventor of video, and the founder General Electric, Thomas Alva Edison once described his countless failed attempts to make a working light bulb saying, "I have not failed. I've just found 10,000 ways that won't work."

REFINE

If your assumptions were not correct, which is the case more often than not, then you need to learn from your mistakes, document your findings, pivot and take action on your newly refined potential solution. Bill Gates described this counterintuitive way of learning by saying, "Your most unhappy customers are your greatest sources of learning."

The true success process bears no resemblance to any of the following processes that you've attempted to use over the years:

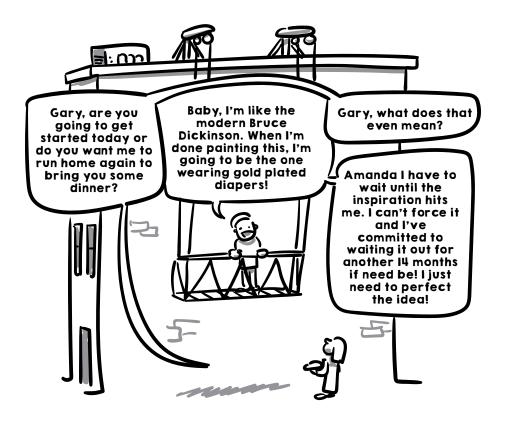
Define. Define. Define. – You can't just spend massive amounts of time speculating about what will work, my man. You need to invest the time needed to develop a detailed plan of what you think will work and then you have to take action quickly. After you have an educated guess in place, YOU MUST TAKE ACTION to get your business idea off the ground.

Act. Act. Act. – You can't just listen to Zig Ziglar and Tony Robbins motivational audio trainings all day while you're running around like a crazy man and hope success will find you. You first have to sit down and define the action items that will turn your big idea into reality, then get moving. To get you off the fence, I've given you three notable quotables to marinate on. If this doesn't get you moving, perhaps a weird encounter with a Taser or cattle prod are needed in your future.

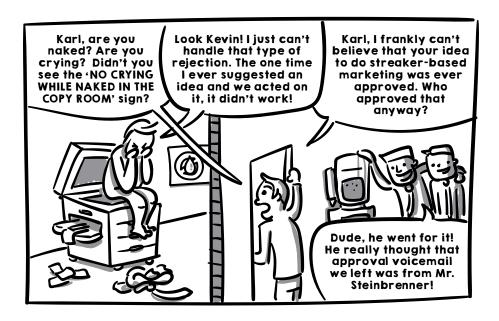

outrageous champion of everything that we did, from our early need to face reality and change the culture to our major initiatives that reshaped the company. Whenever I had an idea or message that I wanted to drive into the organization, I could never say it enough. I repeated it over and over, at every meeting and review for years, until I could almost gag on the words."

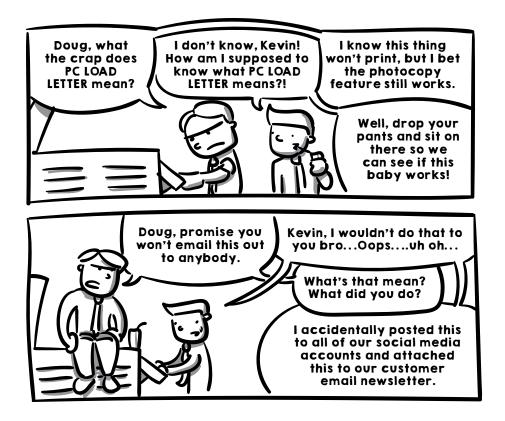

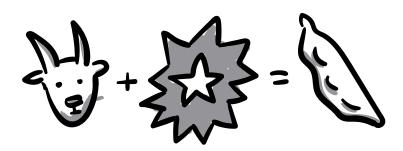


Money is the root of all evil vs. The love of money is the root of all evil

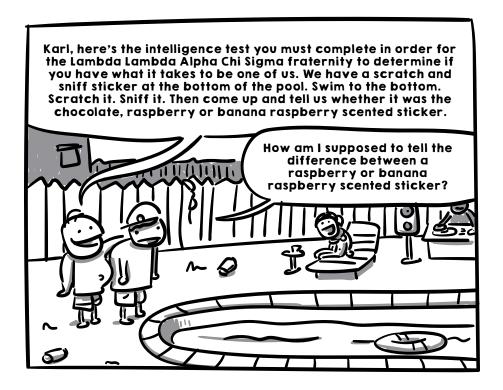
